So we look at our calendar and to get everybody together on this day, it was a tough thing to do, so 00:25:32 18 00:25:37 19 you -- you have all our candidates, our supervisors, our 00:25:42 20 promotional review board, so we were able to schedule that 00:25:46 21 today. So as we speak, they are doing interview for lieutenant. 00:25:50 22 00:25:51 23 And with that, I know Ms. Magonigle will -- probably 00:25:56 24 will cover it, but we will promote one lieutenant and two 00:26:00 25 sergeants and, hopefully, we'll get all the paperwork done by

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the beginning of April.

I'd also like to thank my staff for a job well done. You heard about it and you read about it and see it on TV, the riot at the Maui Correctional Center. I would like to thank the negotiators, they had done a great job talking to the individual at the jail and allow them to come out. They were, of course, in the module, Module B, there were those that incite -- or those that did not agree with the management and, of course, there are those that wanted to come out, so they were able to talk to them and allow them to come out peacefully. I know Acting Assistant Chief Everett Ferreira will cover that, he was the commander on the frontline at the module, so we will allow him the opportunity to do that, to talk to you.

We must have done a great job because 2 days later I received a call from the governor of our state thanking the Maui Police Department for a job well done, preventing something that could have been worse. So they had a few things that they need to do as the department of public safety, reviewing their policies and looking at that and also talking to our legislature to prevent something like this from reoccurring in the future. So I want to thank my staff for doing that.

Just to give you folks an idea of the personnel that we deploy there, we deploy our Special Emergency Enforcement

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Detail, we refer to as our SPEED team, and they were there supporting the adult correctional officers on the ground, making sure that they control the inmates. We also deploy, as I mentioned earlier to you, our negotiators and then our contingency team on the side from our Special Response Team, just in case if something goes south on us, at least there is a team there for rescue or whatever the case may be, so we do have that. And then, of course, our patrol element controlling the perimeters and making sure that our residents that live nearby and also our motorists can travel safely on our roadway.

As you know, the mayor had put out his budget. We review our -- we got a copy of the police department budget and I know Ms. Magonigle will go over it, and so far, so good. A word of caution for my colleagues out there in Molokai, I'm not sure if the councils are happy with the location of the police station. When I had the meeting with the mayor going over the budget and going over the CIP and he was concerned about the location, we explained to him in detail what we had tried in the past. There were questions about the previous location that had been approved, it was a little over 2 acres and they were asking for 1.3 or .4 million dollars and it was close to the county baseyard, but when we did the appraisal, when I came on board as chief, the value of the property was appraised at half of that cost, so as you know that I can't go

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in front of our legislature and ask them for \$600,000 more to do that.

So we did our due diligence looking for everything that is available. Centralizing the station was an important thing for us and also water, getting water to the facility was So what we had done, we looked at every also a concern. possibility of property nearby and even county property, but we couldn't come up with something that is feasible for -- to locate the police station and also to service our community. This property has been presented to us, we review it, we went through our quality assurance, look at the cost for services and where the station is located and the distance and the time that the police will respond. The commander of the district come out with a backup plan that he will have police officers on bicycle in Kaunakakai Town and we still gonna use the old police station for that purpose. And hopefully with your support and the support of this body, we'll be able to see if our council can approve our property.

But, anyway, the mayor also put out a memorandum to the chair of the economic development and budget committee 'cause their plan this year is to minimize the time they spend going through the budget. They believe 9 to 5 they can complete their business. So their thought is and what they're looking at doing is they are not inviting department heads to present their budget and for them to ask questions. What they

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will do is any questions they have, they will forward their questions to the chair of the economic development and budget committee, who then forward a -- the memorandum to the mayor, who will then follow to the department head. And in this case they will send to us and we have 5 working days to respond to the chair. And, again, as we respond, it will go to the mayor and then to the committee.

So that's the proposal and I think it -- you know, like the mayor had mentioned, any changes is good, you know. Sometimes if we can streamline some of the process, sometimes if we can maybe minimize the questions of asking the department head about every single line item, maybe we might move forward, you know. Some of the example is: This year you are requesting \$200 for a line item and last year you had requested \$50, so can you explain that? So I think -- I think our council members, I think, are looking at ways to make it better, you know, that's the whole idea. So just want to let you folks know that's the guidance and the memorandum that we received from the Office of the Mayor.

And thank you, Mr. Chair, for mentioning the Ohana

Day. Again, it's something -- and I'm going to give credit to

Ms. Magonigle and our Acting Assistant Chief Gregg Okamoto

from Support Services. Study shows that officers killed in

line of duty -- we have more officers commit suicide than

officers killed in the line of duty during -- while they're on

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duty, you know, whether it's an officer-involved shooting, motor vehicle accidents, and on and on and on. When they did the study, they realized that officers committing suicide, it's above motor vehicle accidents and officer killed as a result of an officer-involved shooting. So we've had --Ms. Magonigle came up with the idea that maybe it's something that we can look at, address our department with, you know, and that includes the family, you know, like the family support. And we try to mirror it from the military, 'cause in the military it is a requirement, you know, for family support and you must have that and then go on. So, anyway, we would like to see you folks attend. As you can see in the fliers some of the agendas and I think they might go over in detail as what we have, you know, for us.

And with that, that's all I have from my report. spoke with the deputy and, again, he's trying to get this interview out of the way, get all the numbers, and make the announcement hopefully by April 1st, that's what his goal is.

So with that, anybody has any questions?

COMMISSIONER SANTIAGO: One question, Chief. So in the event that the council does not find favor with the location that you folks are currently looking at, is there another site perhaps?

CHIEF FAAUMU: No. We will go back to square one. But to answer your question, what the department has done, so

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we had looked at our options, you know. The first one was stay where we are and as you all know for those of you from Molokai, in case there's a hurricane, tsunami, the department has to evacuate. Based on my experience when I was a commander in Kihei, it will take you 3 hours to evacuate the station and relocate them, so that is from in-custody, evidence, and firearms from the arsenals, and on and on and on before -- even your equipment, you have to relocate equipment. So, of course, the answer was no.

So we looked at another option was that the property, the 2.3, I believe, acres that I had mentioned, of course the price was way out of control.

The third property, there was another property about a mile above where -- from the center and we looked at it, the price was right, but then we learned through visiting the site, it was a fuel depot or a trucking baseyard, so there's a lot of issues there.

And then National Guard, there was another, we looked at National Guard and I spoke to Brigadier General Hara and he basically said that even though they are not using the National Guard now, but they have a future plan for it, you know, so that went out.

And then we also looked at the property where the fire station is, you know, work around that area, and based on what the -- some of our county engineers and everybody in

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planning says it will cost us more money to develop the property before we even put anything on top 'cause I guess it's in the cinders area, something like that.

So that's where we are. And then when this property came up, a little background and you can go on -- add on to it, the family owned the property for generations or many, many years. The husband passed and the widow wanted to relocate to the mainland, be close with the family, and had approached our commander and said, Hey, look, I have this property and I would like to see it used by the government for something good. And we are right now in negotiation with that. So if they turn it down, well, we have to go back to square one and see where we can find something.

But I wanted to reassure this body -- this body that we did everything we can as far as walking on the property, checking if water -- there is water there, potable and nonpotable water, you know. We know that the infrastructure is there and it's centrally located where we can respond to East and West Maui -- I mean, Molokai and even to the North Side, you know. So I know the biggest concern was being away from Kaunakakai, but the counter that the commander come up -- came up with, the bicycle detail, you know -- basically what happened is he's going to certify his patrol officers. It's not that we're going to have bicycle -- a separate bicycle detail. So if you and I are certified and we are beat

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partner, then both of us can rack our bicycle and then we'll drive into Kaunakakai, park the police car, and ride our bicycle, you know, so we can -- that's the whole idea. It has to be two, 'cause in case something happened, somebody has to return to the police car to drive it up to wherever they are.

So hope that answered your question.

COMMISSIONER SANTIAGO: So, Chief, if I may, I'm not really sure on the council's -- I'm sorry, what is their biggest concern regarding that property up at Holomua.

CHIEF FAAUMU: The message that I put out to you was preliminary from the mayor. I spoke to him after he did his presentation. As you all know, his CIP budget is not up yet, but he gave me a heads-up that the council, they are not in favor of that. But, again, it's preliminary. Who knows, maybe, with your influence in there, we can sway them.

Yes.

COMMISSIONER HIRAGA: Chief, when you did prebudget presentation to the council's economic development and committee, anything come up about the Molokai Station?

CHIEF FAAUMU: We did not do a prebudget meeting with the folks. What we did was we met with the mayor and we went over our budget, the CIP, and the mayor -- when the mayor visit the island of Molokai, that was his concern. You know, when he came back, we met with him, we went over the studies we did and now we got what we have.

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Ms. Magonigle, you want to add something? COMMISSIONER HIRAGA: Before you go on, just a correction, I believe it was the GET committee, it wasn't the budget committee that you --

> CHIEF FAAUMU: Oh, yes.

COMMISSIONER HIRAGA: So it was at that committee meeting that I was wondering if anything had come up in the course of your budget and, you know, that -- I mean, I watched you folks on Akaku, but I didn't get all the stuff -- didn't watch the -- view the whole meeting, so --

MS. MAGONIGLE: We had -- before the prebudget committee meeting, we had a meeting with the mayor and MD, and they pretty much advised all the departments not to disclose anything about the FY '20 budget, which our Molokai, you know, station --

> COMMISSIONER HIRAGA: Oh, okay.

MS. MAGONIGLE: -- or land accusation is in the FY So they just think all the departments should '20 budget. stick to FY '19 and not disclose anything from FY '20 because it had not been approved yet, you know, so they said it kind of was premature to go in front of the council saying, We want, you know, a hundred things, but then, you know, the mayor is gonna, you know, do his budget proposal. So during that committee meeting we did not discuss anything from FY '20.

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predator" type of thing where they had their online enticement. I checked with our guys on Saturday, as of Friday night they had five arrests and I believe they had about five or six more the next night. I'm going to be meeting with them either -- later today. One of them is flying back tomorrow to secure the indictments on the grand jury for several of the individuals and we'll be putting up an after-action report to the chief as soon as I get all the details, but I understand it's pretty successful. And the attorney general's office is considering doing it on every island quarterly, which, as we can see from the results, is much needed, yeah.

On March 20th our vice officers did a search warrant at a location -- at an address of 11 Alea Street up in The target of the warrant was a Kapua Harrell. result of the search warrant they recovered just over a pound of crystal meth, almost 5 grams of marijuana, a little over \$3,000 in cash. And, of course, Kapua was not too happy, he was placed under arrest for various felony charges.

That's pretty much all I have for my briefing.

that's why those things take a while. You know, if if we
go off with just one and we hit the house prematurely, the
person's gonna get off and then now he's more tipped off to
what we're doing

ACTING AC FERREIRA: Good morning, everybody.

COMMISSIONERS: Good morning.

ACTING AC FERREIRA: I just want to highlight last month two motor vehicle accidents involving pedestrians and you guys saw it on the news and heard it on the radio. first one occurred on Saturday, March 2nd, about 5:54 hours in The vehicle was headed in the Kahului direction the morning. on Maui Veterans Highway -- old school Mokulele Highway, but Maui Veterans Highway -- when the vehicle struck a homeless female walking within her lane of travel. After that impact, the driver stopped, was trying to protect the female when another vehicle struck the passenger -- I mean, the female that was laying down. The second vehicle stopped for a while, but then drove off, yeah. Later on during the investigation she did contact the police, but because she didn't stop and render aid, she was placed under arrest. Okay. investigation and under the law, the first impact, the lady died from the first impact, so now she becomes a corpse, so that has no effect on -- for the second driver.

And then on a couple days later, 2 days later, early morning hours again, a male was lying on the roadway of Wailea Alanui Road when he was struck by another vehicle. But through investigation, again, it was learned that he was initially struck by some -- another vehicle prior to that, but

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at this time of the investigation, they're still out looking for the initial vehicle that impacted the individual, so that is out.

And for this year so far we have seven fatalities compared to one last year, so, you know, traffic is out there. The holidays we're doing OUI checkpoints and all that, but, you know, it's more education and -- some places are dark and people, even when they're -- early in the morning when they're running, the way they're dressed, they're running in dark clothes and everything, so the potential to have accidents do occur.

And then going back to the riot, as on the -- it's a state facility, so we were there just to assist the corrections officer in squashing this riot. Initially the call came, I -- there's never a good word to say at an appropriate time, but second watch was getting off duty, third watch was coming on duty. Because of the situation, everybody responded initially to MCCC and we initially shut down the road in front of the prison because the call was prisoners rioting. When we got there, an assessment was conducted with the acting warden and then we learned that everybody was confined to Module B, so, you know, everybody was inside. At that point the roadblock was lifted from the roadway and everything was contained within the prison.

As a supporting cast, we held the outside perimeter

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with some of the prison guards that were armed with shotguns with live ammo inside. Our SPEED team was activated and they responded and they made entry into the prison. They stood by while the quards themselves escorted the prisoners out of the module, some by force. They were only ordered to act if needed, yeah. Other than that, they were just standing by.

And, of course, as the chief mentioned, our negotiators was up there. Nick Krau, a negotiator for over 10 years, he was the primary speaker, he got them to come out, There was still some that were hesitant. we had one officer, Masa Kaya from CIU, he was very familiar with a lot of those prisoners inside, so he was our voice from inside, our connection inside making -- and on the outside, his counterpart was counting -- contacting known members that are fluent in the criminal world in Honolulu trying to see if they can help and reach out and assist.

Once that was done, then Criminal Investigations Division came in and did their part of the investigation, coming up with whatever criminal charges happened. overall, the Maui Police Department did their part. Like the chief said, accolades from the mayor's office up to the governor's office, him calling the chief himself personally. So, you know, just to say that we are prepared to respond to whatever comes up and doing it in a professional manner.

That's all I have. Any questions?

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CHIEF FAAUMU: Thank you, Acting Assistant Chief Ferreira.

Acting Assistant Chief Lieutenant Okamoto.

ACTING AC OKAMOTO: Good morning. Just an update on the current recruit class, which is our 88th recruit class, they are taking their physical training final assessment tomorrow. If they pass, they move on to firearms training. There's still nine recruits left, so that's good. Our graduation is June 28th, just as a reminder, yeah.

For the 89th recruit class following that, currently there are nine recruits hired and they're all working at the receiving desk right now. They start June 3rd.

On the dispatch side as far as personnel, we have one emergency services dispatcher starting on April 1st and currently there are five in training right now, so...

Tip a Cop we had on March 1st and March 2nd. For those of you who are not familiar with Tip a Cop, it's a fundraising event that we partner with Special Olympics on Maui where we have volunteer officers, they'll assist the wait staff, they go around bussing tables, refilling their drinks, and they engage the patrons and kind of educate them about the Special Olympics programs here on Maui and then they leave a tip envelope on the table separate from the wait staff tip and if they're so inclined, they'll -- the patrons will leave a separate donation for the Special Olympics. So over the 2

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days we raised a total of \$3,955 in donations, so that's very good, that's actually better than last year's, last year's total. So always -- always a worthwhile event, so -- Special Olympics is down there, they have athletes down there, you know, kind of the face of the program also greeting, greeting guests as they come in as well as the facility, so...

I don't know if you -- has anybody gone to that?

COMMISSIONER REDEKER: I was. I was there.

ACTING AC OKAMOTO: You were there? Yeah, yeah.

It's always worthwhile. Next year -- we do it every year, so, yeah.

Tomorrow is DARE rally, again, at the stadium, baseball stadium. It starts at nine, runs till about twelve o'clock, so if you guys can make it, yeah.

And like the Chief mentioned, we have our first

Ohana Day. I have some fliers I'm going to pass out to you
guys, you know, it has a presentation schedule on there.

Again, it's a brainchild of Ms. Magonigle, but we also have a
committee made up of family members and spouses, so when -when she created this, this idea, you know, they were quick to
kind of step up, because they're the ones who are directly
involved, you know, by the careers of our officers. And,
again, it's the whole healthy lifestyle choices as well as
financial planning and -- and I guess it's this whole -- this
whole -- what do you call it? Whole being approach or

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whole -- where it's not just the physical side, but also the emotional and financial and just planning for the future. So I really appreciate Ms. Magonigle for pushing this through, but we'll see how it goes. Saturday at the Velma McWayne Santos Community Center, it runs from 10 in the morning till 6 in the evening, so if you guys can make it.

And then what else do we have?

April 6th we have our Troy Barboza Torch Run again, another Special Olympics event. Again, the route -- have you participated? If you guys haven't participated in that, it runs from the First Hawaiian Bank on Puunene, Kaahumanu, and it's a 2-mile route that comes up Kaahumanu Avenue, turns on Wahine Pio, and it end up in Keopuolani Park, so... We have shirts for sale. We have a flier here. So if you want to support it, you can purchase a shirt and also participate in the run. And also we have a separate shorter walk, walking route as well too, if you guys are interested, so... Molokai had their Torch Run this past Saturday. They had about 70 participants involved. And Lanai will be holding their torch run this coming Saturday, so...

Next week, April 4th, it's a Thursday, at 3:30 in the afternoon we will be having our promotion pinning ceremony for our newly promoted sergeants and lieutenants. It will be right here in the chief's lobby. Three sergeants and three new lieutenants, so the chief will be there presenting them

with their rank and then their family members will be there to 00:56:21 1 00:56:24 2 pin the -- pin the badge on them. 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We're actually going to -- we're -- we kicked off our Distracted Driver Campaign as well too. I mean, we periodically do that. It's a -- it's a national campaign, but we're going to have, you know, enhanced enforcement and also more public outreach as far as education, education-wise as far as like the dangers of distracted driving, so we'll do that.

And then also, I don't know if you guys heard, it's Vision Zero. We're going to be working with the mayor's office where I guess it's kind of like doing more as a community as trying to -- they call it Vision Zero because the goal is, you know, zero traffic fatalities, but, you know, realistically, you know, we're just kind of trying to do our best, so we're going to be participating in that. So our first meeting is this Friday at the mayor's office, so...

And, yeah, that's all I have for now, so thank you. Sorry if I took too long for you. I want to talk about it. Yes, questions. CHIEF FAAUMU:

COMMISSIONER REDEKER: I was looking through your -the stats on the highlights and I looked at the -- under the SRT, you had -- for February you had six actions that you took place in, but there was 23 arrests, were -- I mean, were some of those pretty big actions.

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For CIP, again, it provides all the balances and

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money encumbered for the different -- so it's FY '18 and FY '19 CIP projects. As mentioned, for FY '20 we submitted two projects, one being the Molokai Police Station, the land acquisition and to do the conceptual design. The other CIP project we submitted was for the Wailuku Police Station resurfacing and to replace the car wash here at the Wailuku Station, so that we're still waiting to hear back about.

For the FY '20 budget, we did receive the mayor's proposed budget to the council. So far it's gone through the A account and the C account. Pretty much on the C account for equipment, everything we did ask for on equipment was approved with the exception of the vehicles. We had asked for approximately 100 vehicles, out of that 25 were approved, so that was the one thing on our equipment that was significantly

I also do want to bring up that CID had put in for a grant, for a JAG grant, they were approved for about \$80,000, so there were about six items, because of that grant, we were able to take off of the FY '20 budget, so that did help us in getting some other equipment that was much needed. So right now that'll go in front of council and we'll wait to see what

So as far as the operating expenses, what I had done is I had just either increased or deceased our operating budget based on historical amounts. So in our budget it'll

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give what we spent in FY '16, FY '17, FY '18, so if it's something that we need more money for, I would increase, or if we didn't spend the money in the past years, then we would decrease. And then based on the commanders, what they needed, I would, you know, ask for the additional amounts based on that.

when we had our prebudget meeting with the command staff, a total of 47.5 positions were requested. That includes cadets, that's why there's a 0.5. What we submitted to the mayor, we had requested 29 positions including ten cadets. What was approved in the mayor's proposed budget, 13 positions. So out of the 13, five of those is one sergeant for police officers for the CORE Unit that we do have a COPS grant for, and then he also did submit for 16 cadets and those are part-time positions and so that's a program that we also are looking to, I guess, reestablish. So that's what went through with the -- on the mayor's budget so far.

For the staffing report, as mentioned, there were promotions already done effective March 16th, three sergeants were promoted; one went to Hana, one to Molokai, and one to receiving desk. The three lieutenants; one went to Kihei, one to Wailuku Patrol, and one to Hana Patrol. We will still be promoting two more sergeants and that will be going to the receiving desk and one more lieutenant, that's what they're

doing interviews today, that will be going Lahaina Patrol. 01:04:56 1 also have three captain positions, promotional opportunities 01:05:00 2 01:05:03 3 available, that interview will be on April 16th. And I -- we had a discussion about what had happened with the mayor, what was submitted to the mayor and what the mayor did. I think there's a real opportunity for us as a commission to testify to the council about what the department needs. I'm concerned that the mayor would cut 100 vehicles down to 25. I think it's important that the department continue to implement their policy about how many miles are put on a car.

I'm concerned that we make sure that the department gets the equipment, the tools, what they need, because I think one of our number one problems is recruitment and retention and if the department does not have the tools they need, that has to effect how we are able to retain officers. So I am thinking maybe we should put this on our agenda for a future meeting, but I think there's a real opportunity for us. It is one of the main things the commission is supposed to do, is be in charge of the budget for the police department, and I think there's more we could do to help the department here. I'm

COMMISSIONER HIRAGA: -- address the committee, so that makes it even -- you know, somewhat challenging. And in the past we were aware of what departments would be coming up, so somehow we need to have somebody let us know -- I think chief might know best -- as to when we can anticipate the possible date that they will be reviewing the department's budget. But it's a different process this year and initially I would say somewhat challenging, but it's okay. I mean, you know, if it can streamline, I think that's very good, you know.

> CHIEF FAAUMU: Any other questions?

Mr. Chairman, let me just conclude my report. know in our presentation there were a couple things that brought up and legitimate concern by the commissioners as we did our report on the -- addressing our drug problems. Vice Division, you know, they run long-term investigation and the design of our Vice Division is mid-management and midlevel drug dealers and up, and to include organized -- drug organized folks. And then the question is what happened to the street, you know, the dailies, as the commissioner mentioned. So what we are doing, we have our Crime Reduction Unit, they are doing the daily -- we assign them to some of the concern, they came up from the mayor's office, some of the

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concern from our community. We assign our Crime Reduction Unit.

The other thing we do, we also empower our patrol element and what we are doing is to cultivate future leaders and future investigators. So we allow our commanders in the districts to do a special investigation if they come across issues, concerns from the mayor's office and things like that. So we allow our patrol officers to work with the prosecutor's office with the guidance of former narcotic officers who are now rank and file to guide them in their attempt. And there have been successful stories coming out from our patrol element and that's what we are doing in the meantime as our Vice Division and our Criminal Investigation Division are working on mid-level drug dealers.

The concern about our pedestrians fatalities -- and I know when we look at the victims on this tragic incidents, these are folks that they don't have a place to go to. So what the department are doing is we -- but let me -- before I present it, I just want to let you folks know that we have tried -- we are going to schedule a presentation to this body of a new program that we've come up with. It is part of our way of addressing the community need. There is a program that's going nationwide, it's Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion. Basically we're going to address homelessness and mentally challenged individual and we applied for a grant.

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So the grant is not going to come to the department, because the last time we applied for a grant, it came to the department, it got held up out there for about 4 or 5 years --3 years now, yeah?

> MS. MAGONIGLE: Yeah.

So what we are doing now is we work CHIEF FAAUMU: side by side with the service provider, so the money will go to the service provider. We can identify the service provider and they will be the one that address the call. And what the police department going to do? We will be like the conductor, we'll be in the middle. We're going to develop a hui or a group of stakeholders which include the prosecutor's office, the public defenders, the sheriff, the judiciary, and department of health, and then we'll work side by side with We're going to address the homeless and we're going to address the mentally ill. The grant is not big enough, so what we'll do is we did a study and looked at the area of concern and Central Maui is the biggest area of concern, so we're going to focus on Central Maui first. And if it becomes successful -- it is -- like I said, it's a pilot program. Ιf it becomes successful, then we can expand it, you know, based on -- the grant was part of the governor's emergency proclamation on homelessness and we were able to get some money from that and, hopefully, we can address those issues.

Going back with the riot that has mentioned, post

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riot, just to let you folks know, our chaplains and our Peer Support have played a big role with addressing the issue with employees and families. And I would like to acknowledge them, they've been out there day in/day out, they've been calling them. And I told -- I spoke to the chaplains and I said, you know, to take as many people as you need to help these folks. And these -- these individuals are the employees and also the families of the employees, so we are doing that as we speak.

We'd also like to -- I'd like to acknowledge our public information officer, our lieutenant -- or he was.

During the riot, he was the middle person between the state, the county, and us. He was the conduit as far as information going out and information -- and keeping the state -- our state level in Honolulu update on what was going on on the ground, so I want to commend him for a job well done. He gets to hear as I vented my frustration to him, there's only two people in the department that do that, it's the deputy and him, and so he -- he did an outstanding job and, like I said, you know, two days later the governor called, so a testament to what he did.

I would like to -- on the budget side, I would like to acknowledge our chairperson for SHOPO, Lieutenant Vickers. What Lieutenant Vickers had done is he had reached out to the council and send an invitation to them and schedule an appointment with all the commanders in the department. And

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some had accepted his invitation and visit the department, get to see our operation in person, and hopefully they will remember that during budget time. But I want to acknowledge, Lieutenant, thank you for doing that for the department.

Last, but not least, as mentioned, recruitment and retention. Recruitment and retention is an issue, it's always an issue, you know, sometimes it affects the chief's missions and vision for the department. But we mentioned the cadet program, you know, for the -- for those of you former commissioners, you are fully aware of the cadet program. And the reason why we went -- we wanted to revisit the cadet program, when we were on Lanai, I think a gentleman testified that was probably testimony about recruitment, and so we did -- and we talked to the mayor about it. But this time around, we're going to change it a little. You know, in the past everybody will apply for the position and then work out of our receiving desk, but this year what we're going to do, if it's going to be -- if the council approve it, we're going to assign so many positions to our rural districts: Molokai, and Hana. And if we have candidates there, they will report to the districts and work from there.

The program is going to be run by his shop,

Lieutenant Okamoto, Acting Chief Okamoto. They will come up

with the curriculum, they will manage the cadet program, and
then instead of having them come in and shred papers, we're

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going to provide a curriculum and make sure that our legal folks approve what we put out and then we'll review that. So it is in the works right now and so when these folks come in, we will provide them some training. And what we are looking for is, as you all know, we have our Teen Academy, our vision is when they -- the Teen Academy is more for high school up to seniors, so if a senior graduated and got accepted to the cadet program, we can announce that at the graduation of the Teen Academy, you know, Congratulations, you're moving up and this time around, you'll get paid for it, you know, the mayor has budget for that.

I have a couple more. Special Response Team, and I know there was a question from commissioners, the reason why the Special Response Team is involved in a lot of our raids is by policy. It is the responsibility of the agent or the investigator in charge of the investigation to identify any threat. So if they identify a threat and we went -- we go through our threat assessment and we believe there is danger in there, it is mandated that the Special Response Team will execute the search warrant. They will be briefed on it, they will execute, secure the place, and turn it over to the investigative team.

And other than that, I think that's all I have, Mr. Chairman. I know we took a lot of your time, but I hope -- if anybody has any questions.

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COMMISSIONER FEINBERG: A question about the riot.

One of the things that resonated with me is that you had reached out to former or -- or people on Oahu that were either connected to the people that were in the prison -- were these people actually incarcerated on Oahu or these were people that had previously been incarcerated that you had contact with and that you knew that they knew either family members or something to calm them down?

ACTING AC FERREIRA: Let me answer that.

CHIEF FAAUMU: Sure.

ACTING AC FERREIRA: Right off the bat, I have no idea who they contacted, but we were made aware they were in contact with people, I don't know if they were either incarcerated or outside or they were family members that reached out.

COMMISSIONER FEINBERG: And who did the contacting?

ACTING AC FERREIRA: CIU, personnel from CIU.

ACTING AC OKAMOTO: If I may, so I just want to add my comment to the whole situation and it's kind of like, you know, tooting our own horn, but I think it's well deserved.

Because I think what people don't realize is that while it was -- technically it fell under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Safety, the prison all that -- it seemed more like an MPD operation and it's not because, like Acting Assistant Chief Ferreira said, you know, we're -- we're there

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in a support role and it's not like we're coming in to take over, but we're looked upon for some sort of leadership or some sort of action, because, like I said, I think the prison itself, you know, they're -- they have their challenges, they have their issues. So in something like that, you know, I mean, and I think it's just a testament, you know, the department under the chief's leadership.

As far as the amount of resources that we, you know, committed to that, you know, we had the Special Response Team, we had the detectives, we had the SPEED team, we had the negotiators, we had Captain Everett Ferreira, our secret weapon, was inserted into the prison right away, so -- but, anyway, you know, along with the chaplaincy and all that, we actually were instrumental in -- in kind of quelling that situation and, you know, we're not -- I mean, we were recognized by the governor after the fact, but, you know, I mean, not too many people really know how much we were involved and I just want to share with you folks because we fall under the police commission and, you know, you guys always support in getting us personnel and equipment and, you know, I think it was -- it was much needed at that time.

And also, again, just a bit about the chief said about the -- our Peer Support Team, which actually falls under our Chaplaincy Program, which falls under the Support Services Bureau. So the prison, they have their own Peer Support Team,
